

BREACH OF THE CODE OF PRACTICE FOR OFFICIAL STATISTICS

This document reports a breach of the Code of Practice for Official Statistics, or the relevant Pre-release Access to Official Statistics Orders, to which the Code applies as if it included these orders.

2. Circumstances of breach

Relevant Principle/Protocol and Practice

- Protocol 2 - Release practices
 - Practice 7 – Subject to compliance with the rules and principles on pre-release access set out in legislation, limit access before public release to those people essential for production and publication, and for quality assurance and operational purposes. Publish records of those who have access prior to release.
 - Practice 8 – Ensure that no indication of the substance of a statistical report is made public, or given to the media or any other party not recorded as eligible for access before publication. Report to the National Statistician immediately any accidental or wrongful release, and investigate the circumstances.

Date of occurrence

23 November 2015

Nature of breach (including links with previous breaches, if any)

- Ministerial briefing material containing statistics from the above restricted publications was accidentally shared by a Department of Health (DH) Press Officer with four internal staff within the Department of Health Press Office who were not on the approved pre-release access (PRA) list.
- As soon as they spotted the error, the recipients were asked to delete the material by the DH briefing co-ordinators and alerted HSCIC immediately.
- HSCIC obtained individual written confirmation from each of the recipients that the briefing material had been deleted unread from their email inboxes.

Reasons for breach

Human error occurred. The instructions in the email clearly stated that the material must not be shared, circulated, published or otherwise discussed with anyone not on the approved list prior to the official publication date and time. However, the contents were inadvertently forwarded to the wrong contact.

3. Reactions and impact (both within the producer body and outside)

The recipients confirmed that the emails and attachments were deleted unread. The pre-release materials were not seen by any unauthorised parties.

4. Corrective actions taken to prevent reoccurrence of such a breach (include short-term actions, and long-term changes made to procedures)

The HSCIC Head of Profession has discussed the breach with the DH Head of Profession in and has been assured that colleagues in the Department (especially the Press Office) understand the importance of complying with the Code when handling pre-release access material.

The DH Head of Profession and DH briefing co-ordinator have discussed this with the Press Office and will be updating their information pack for their Press Office.

We will reiterate the controls needed when future pre-release access requests are received. This will be clearly stated when the breaching parties are next involved in a PRA request, in addition to being stated every time we grant approval to a pre-release access request.
