CONFIRMATION OF NATIONAL STATISTICS DESIGNATION FOR ONS AVOIDABLE MORTALITY STATISTICS

Annex: Review of actions taken in response to Assessment Report 339 on ONS Avoidable Mortality statistics

<p>Ensure that users can easily locate all relevant Avoidable Mortality information on the ONS website.</p>	<p>The article socioeconomic inequalities in avoidable mortality has been added to the page 'publications related to causes of death' as requested.</p> <p>A direct link to the avoidable mortality definition consultation document is now available via the bulletin.</p>	<p>We judge that ONS has met this Requirement. Based on our conversations with stakeholders, the current ONS website structure does not always meet user needs. Locating all the materials related to a specific topic can require some navigation from document to document, or using the website's search function. We encourage the statistics team, in collaboration with colleagues in ONS publishing, to continue enhancing their users' experience of using the website.</p>
<p>Put processes in place for maintaining continuity of expert clinical and public health advice to ensure that there would be no material impact on data quality if a change of advisor were to occur, or if they were temporarily unavailable.</p>	<p>An additional expert advisor has been identified and has agreed to take on this role if required in future. They have published widely on this topic and recently guided the OECD in their deliberations to develop an international harmonised definition of avoidable mortality.</p>	<p>This Requirement has been met.</p>
<p>Fulfil commitments to provide further information about how the definition of avoidable mortality differs from hospital avoidable deaths, update the QMI, and clarify how small numbers of deaths are handled.</p>	<p>Additional text about hospital avoidable deaths has been added to the two most recent bulletins, and this has been flagged in a notice at the top of the page as well.</p> <p>An updated QMI was published on 1 February 2019 with new information about how deaths of non-residents are handled in each country, registration periods, and how small numbers are handled in analyses.</p>	<p>This Requirement has been met. We recommend that the information about hospital avoidable deaths continues to be included in the main bulletin text when the 2017 statistics are released.</p>
